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
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From the Executive Director

services because his behavior is so bad. His
Behavior Support Plan is NOT working. I get
calls from the teacher every day. When I asked
the Principal he said, "no, because Keoki's
behavior is not harming himself or others." This
just doesn't seem right.

Dear Confused,

You are right. According to ACT 205, which regulates FBAs and ABA services it says, "The use of functional behavior assessment is appropriate when the student's behavior impedes learning processes..." If Keoki's behavior is making it hard for him to learn, then you should request an IEP meeting to discuss his behavior, review behavior data

if there is any, using the information you collected from the Behavior Support Plan, and request an FBA. Be sure you have your current progress reports available for reference.




Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands
